What are digital platforms?	Digital platforms could be a website, an APP, a social networking
	site, an online forum where users can share content and
	information. Basically, anywhere online where people connect,
	share and/or discuss topics.

	Engaging in a conversation which becomes heated and name calling, or threating language is use could be considered unlawful discrimination or bullying
	Sharing information or documents that belong GGA or an SGGO could be a breach of confidentiality
	Using images, photos, artwork or logos that do not belong to you, may breach copyright and trademark laws
What is included under the policy?	The policy covers all GGiA online and digital activities — this includes things such as Unit or District Facebook pages, online fundraising pages, use of GGA or SGGO email addresses, access to SGGO or GGA systems (such as IMiS or SharePoint) and use of Girl Guiding devices such as smart devices, laptops.
Why is it important to consider being safe online?	Girl Guiding emails, paper records and databases can all contain a large amount of personal information that can be used to identify a person. For example, photos a Unit meeting could have a Guide wearing a school jumper where the name of the school is visible. Personal information needs to be protected to keep our members safe.
